## SAPPHIRE GRAIN - A ready-to-use grain bait

Authorisation no: UK-2015-0904 - For use as a rodenticide by Professional users with demonstrated competence (trained professional) for the control of rats (Rattus norvegicus & Rattus rattus) and mice (Mus musculus) indoors and outdoors around buildings. **Use-specific instructions for use: Application rate:** For rats: 50-100 g of bait per bait station or covered and protected baiting points. If more than one bait station is needed, the minimum distance between balt stations should be of 5 meters. For mice: 20-30 g of balt per balt station or covered and protected baiting points. If more than one bait station is needed, the minimum distance between bait stations should be of 2 meters. Regularly check bait consumption and replace consumed or spoilt bait until consumption has stopped. When used in burrows: Baits must be placed to minimise the exposure to non-target species and children. Cover or block the entrances of baited burrows to reduce the risks of bait being rejected and spilled. **If used for pulsed baiting:** Replace eaten bait only after 3 days and then at maximum 7 day intervals. Collect any spilled bait and dead rodents. - Protect bait from the atmospheric conditions. Place the baiting points in areas non-liable to flooding. Replace any bait in baiting points in which bait has been damaged by water or contaminated by dirt. - For outdoor use, baiting points must be covered and placed in strategic sites to minimise the exposure to non-target species - Balts must be placed to minimise the exposure to non-target species and children. Remove the remaining product at the end of treatment period. Repeat treatment in situations where there is evidence of new infestation. Follow any additional instructions provided by the CRRU UK Code of Best Practice (or equivalent). - Read and follow the product information as well as any information accompanying the product or provided at the point of sale before using it. - Carry out a pre-baiting survey of the infested area and an on-site assessment in order to identify the rodent species, their places of activity and determine the likely cause and the extent of the infestation. - Remove food which is readily attainable for rodents (e.g. spilled grain or food waste). Apart from this, do not clean up the infested area just before the treatment, as this only disturbs the rodent population and makes bait acceptance more difficult to achieve. - The product should only be used as part of an integrated pest management (IPM) system, including, amongst others, hygiene measures and, where possible, physical methods of control. -The product should be placed in the immediate vicinity of places where rodent activity has been previously explored (e.g. travel paths, nesting sites, feedlots, holes, burrows etc.), - Where possible, bait stations must be fixed to the ground or other structures. - Bait stations must be clearly labelled to show they contain rodenticides and that they must not be moved or opened. - Bait should be secured so that it cannot be dragged away from the bait station. - Place the product out of the reach of children, birds, pets and farm animals and other non-target animals. -Place the product away from food, drink and animal feeding stuffs, as well as from utensils or surfaces that have contact with these. - Wear protective chemical resistant gloves during product handling phase (Nitril, EN374).- When using the product do not eat, drink or smoke. Wash hands and directly exposed skin after using the product. -The frequency of visits to the treated area should be at the discretion of the operator, in the light of the survey conducted at the outset of the treatment. That frequency should be consistent with the recommendations provided by the CRRU UK Code of Best Practice (or equivalent). -Sites where burrow baiting is used should be visited more frequently than those where secure balt boxes are employed. - If balt uptake is low relative to the apparent size of the infestation, consider the replacement of balt points to further places and the possibility to change to another balt formulation. - If after a treatment period of 35 days balts are continued to be consumed and no decline in rodent activity can be observed, the likely cause has to be determined. Where other elements have been excluded, it is likely that there are resistant rodent so consider the use of a non-anticoagulant rodenticide, where available, or a more potent anticoagulant rodenticide. Also consider the use of traps as an alternative control measure. Loose grain: Place the balt in the baiting point by using a dosage devise. Use a method to minimise dust (e.g. wet wiping). Use-specific risk mitigation measures: -Where possible, prior to the treatment inform any possible bystanders (e.g. users of the treated area and their surroundings) about the rodent control campaign. Consider preventive control measures (e.g. plug holes, remove potential food and drinking as far as possible) to improve product intake and reduce the likelihood of reinvasion. - To reduce risk of secondary poisoning, search for and remove dead rodents during treatment at frequent intervals, in line with the recommendations provided by the relevant code of best practice
